The Energy Training Program

The Energy Training Program for Students was developed to encourage private-sector employers to hire Nova Scotian post-secondary students for career-related work terms in all sectors of the energy industry. The program runs every summer and offers employers an opportunity to gain access to students and recent graduates from Nova Scotia universities and community college campuses.

The wage subsidy is available to hire postsecondary students and recent graduates, based on the following requirements:

Non co-op students and recent graduates

must be employed for a minimum of 12 weeks and a maximum of 17 weeks.

Co-op students must be employed for a minimum of 14 weeks and a maximum of 17 weeks. The position must be approved by the co-op coordinator of the educational institution.

A wage subsidy is available for small to medium-sized Nova Scotia companies involved in the energy sector. Eligible companies may receive a 50% wage incentive toward student salaries up to \$7.50 per hour.
